Just over half (7) matched into family medicine. Other specialties the students matched included: child neurology, EM, OBGYN, ortho, med/peds, and med prelim. Rural LIC placement planning for Class of 2028

We will be sending out student confirmations and contact info for the Class of 2028 to Rural LIC sites in the coming weeks. As you can imagine, the 1st year students are eager to find out their placements for later this Fall! As part of our planning for the 2025-2026 academic year, the students will have an additional clinical immersion in the Denver metro area before arriving at their Rural LIC sites. All of them will complete 2-weeks of adult inpatient medicine. They will also complete two 2-week immersions at the beginning and one 2-week immersion at the end of the LIC year in inpatient pediatrics, inpatient psychiatry, and general surgery or OBGYN. Following the clinical immersions and basecamp preparatory activities, the students will move to their respective communities at the end of October and should be ready to start with you on Monday, November 3, 2025!
